
Centrally located on the east coast of the South Island, with an infrastructure backed up by a lifestyle second to none – where else would you want to live and do business?

Arts and Culture & Heritage

Timaru District offers a range of arts and cultural activities – from viewing exhibitions at the various galleries in the district, to watching a live performance at one of our theatres.

The regional Aigantighe Art Gallery is nationally acclaimed to have one of the best collections in regional New Zealand, while South Canterbury Museum in the central Timaru CBD has a focus on the natural heritage and history of the South Canterbury region.

Timaru District holds the most significant collection of ancient Māori rock art in New Zealand and Te Ana Māori Rock Art Centre offers a fascinating interactive exhibition experience.

Study

From pre-school and primary through to secondary or tertiary, there is an excellent range of high quality education and training in Timaru District to cater to a wide range of interests, learning requirements and career opportunities.

Timaru has a campus near the heart of the CBD, of Ara Institute of Canterbury, which is recognised as one of New Zealand's leading tertiary institutes.

Ara specialises in applied, vocational and professional training, offering more than 150 certificates, diplomas, degrees and graduate qualifications across a wide range of subjects.

Subjects taught at Ara's Timaru campus include nursing, midwifery, food and hospitality, art and design, human services, hair and beauty, early childhood education, Te Reo Māori, English, and a range of trades.



Activities & Attractions

On the same day you can mountain bike, snowboard and surf.... take your pick! Outdoor pursuits – white water rafting, kayaking, fishing, hunting, horse riding, walking and hiking, mountain biking, sailing, golf, four wheel-drive tours and much more, are plentiful and easily accessible.

Timaru District has a very active and continually growing events programme and regularly hosts national events. The Caroline Bay Carnival, the longest running carnival of its type in New Zealand, has been a favourite with families from all over the country since its early days over 100 years ago. Other events attracting locals and visitors from around the region include Brews on the Bay, Caroline Bay Rock and Hop, South Island Master Games (biennial), Geraldine Festival, SCOFF (South Canterbury Outstanding Food Festival), the Seaside Festival, 4 & Rotary and motor sport racing at the Timaru International Motor Raceway.



Sport and Leisure

Sporting activities and events play an important part in the lives of Timaru District residents. Sporting facilities, both indoor and outdoor, are plentiful. Parks, gyms, international tennis facilities, netball, soccer, rugby, athletics and cricket grounds, swimming pools and events facilities are widely spread throughout the district.

Timaru District is a central South Island sporting base of choice for major tournaments and events. Easy access, affordable accommodation and plenty of activities for families and supporters, ensures any visit becomes a memorable occasion.



Affordable Houses

The average current house value in the Timaru District for the year ending March 2024 was 526,729 (Infometrics Quarterly Economic Report). This compares with Christchurch City's average house value in the same period of \$761,873 and Auckland's value was \$1,290,000.

Prices for premium top end properties in prime locations begin at about \$900,000 and go up to \$1 million-plus. Rural lifestyle properties on the outskirts of town can be sought after and can range from \$900,000 up to well over \$1.5 million depending on location and land size. Entry level housing for a basic ownership unit begins at about \$350,000, while most real estate market activity is in the price range between \$500,000 and \$800,000.

Many new residents choose to rent a home when first arriving in the region. The rental for a three bedroom family home ranges from \$480 to a high end of \$750 per week depending on the quality and location of the property.



Health Services 2024

Timaru District offers a range of both public and private medical facilities. Te Whatu Ora South Canterbury is one of the largest employers in the region, employing around 1000 part-time, full-time staff and contractors. Timaru Hospital is a 131-bed facility, with a range of inpatient, outpatient and community secondary services.

Bidwill Trust Hospital is a private surgical hospital with 14 inpatient rooms, three operating theatres and a day surgery unit. Pacific Radiology is on site alongside Bidwill for private radiology services.



Our Towns

Timaru

Timaru District is enjoyed by a population of approximately 48,900 people with the main population centre in Timaru City, of approximately 25,900.

Timaru was built on rolling hills created from the lava flows of the extinct Mt Horrible volcano, with the result that most of the main streets are undulating, in clear contrast with the flat landscape of the Canterbury Plains to the north.

Central Timaru boasts an historically beautiful Edwardian central business district, linked to the Caroline Bay recreational area. Vistas from the central city over the iconic Caroline Bay through rolling hills to the Southern Alps, are breathtaking. The name Timaru is taken from the Maori "Te Maru", meaning "The place of shelter". Timaru City is the second largest urban centre in Canterbury, two hours drive south of Christchurch.

Pleasant Point

Known around the world for its historic steam train at the Pleasant Point Museum and Railway, the small town of Pleasant Point has a population of 1220 and is 19km north-west of Timaru, on State Highway 8. Train buffs from around New Zealand and the world, flock to see the steam locomotives and one of only two Model T Ford railcar replicas in the world. Pleasant Point is an important service town for the surrounding farming district.

Peel Forest

Peel Forest is a small community located alongside the 773 hectare Peel Forest Park forest reserve. The small settlement has a campground, café and outdoor recreation facility.

Temuka

With a population of 4050 people, Temuka township is situated 19 kilometres north of Timaru, on State Highway 1. It is an important service town for the surrounding rural area and is famous for producing the iconic Temuka Pottery. Rich with local history, the small town of Temuka was once home to Richard Pearse – the man who raced the Wright Brothers to become the first man to fly a plane.

Geraldine

Picturesque Geraldine is located 36 kilometres north west of Timaru with a population of approximately 2300.

Geraldine has a charming village atmosphere and offers great cafes and boutique shopping. The town has built its reputation as a centre of arts and crafts. It is a popular stopping point for national and international visitors heading inland to Aoraki Mt Cook and visitors of all ages enjoy the fascinating collection of vintage museums, plus delicious food tastings from the local producers, including iconic Kiwi brand Barker's of Geraldine.


- 63.7% of students were enrolled in some sort of tertiary study one year after leaving secondary school. (4.4% above the national average).

Economy

The Timaru District economy is strongly influenced by its agricultural heritage. From mana whenua settlement, to the early European sheep farmers, our richly productive agricultural sector has grown to become one of New Zealand's most prolific food and fibre producers. Today's farming is heavily influenced by dairy, with horticulture, intensive cropping, meat and wool also playing an important role. Significant manufacturing, processing, engineering and distribution operations contribute to extensive export and domestic supply of a wide range of goods and services. This provides an array of employment opportunities across all sectors from trades and manufacturing to the professional, service and primary sectors. The Timaru District prides itself on having one of the lowest unemployment rates in New Zealand.

The wider South Canterbury region enjoys reliable and accessible water for irrigation and industry – some of the most affordable resource in the country. This continues to provide the impetus for the development and growth of successful food processing and exporting operations. Large scale investment in water storage, quality and management is continuing, helping to ensure a robust, diverse economic future for the District.

Industry Hubs & Logistics

Serviced by road, rail, sea and air, the Timaru District industrial hub provides a growing number of businesses with their core requirements to maintain and expand their business base, in a seismically sound area, supported by a welcoming business community. The main industrial hub is Timaru's northern boundary on both sides of State Highway One, Washdyke, with access to the main trunk railway line. On the southern boundary of Timaru, Redruth is a long established industrial area that typically has slightly lower costs for land and/or rental. Redruth is home to the Timaru District Council's innovative recycling centre. Geraldine and Temuka townships also have areas of industrial land available including industrial zoned expansion in Geraldine.

Accessible - Proactive & Connected

The Timaru District is within 2.5 hours drive of 80% of the South Island's population, and is home to a variety of market leading businesses which demonstrate a high level of forward thinking and "can do" attitudes. From technology, to logistics, to education, the district has some of the best resources available in these industries that will be at the forefront of the quickly changing workforce in years to come.

Timaru Airport

Also known as Richard Pearse Airport, Timaru Airport is located just 10 minutes' drive north of Timaru City and is serviced by daily flights to Wellington, providing connections to national and international flight services.

Timaru Container Terminal

The Timaru Container Terminal is a wholly owned subsidiary of Port of Tauranga and was established in 2013 in a strategic alliance between PrimePort Timaru and Port of Tauranga. In November 2020, Port of Tauranga's subsidiary Quality Marshalling officially took over the day-to-day operation of the terminal.

PrimePort Timaru

The District's busy port is set on the edge of Timaru's CBD, providing a vital link to shipping services for importers and exporters.

PrimePort has over 50 hectares of commercial flat land adjacent to it, with more on-site storage than most other New Zealand ports. This includes in excess of 100,000 tonnes of cold storage, bulk liquid storage and significant bulk storage warehouse capacity.

There is lease land available for development for storage distribution or processing facilities associated with import or export activities.
